ISCM World New Music Days 2021 in Shanghai Cancelled

ISCM World New Music Days Festival 2021, which was to be held in Shanghai this March has had to be cancelled. Ol'ga Smetanová, Secretary General of the ISCM,

said in a letter to CANZ that the organisers decided to cancel the festival due to the Omicron epidemic, and that Chinese Travel Restrictions, Rules, and Quarantine Policies

have made holding the festival in Shanghai unfeasible.

The Executive Committee has accepted the cancellation, and discussions are in ongoing

as to what will happen with the works that were selected for performance in WNMD2021.

Published in 2011, this score collection brings together 12 works commissioned by Stephen De Pledge from composers including **Gillian Whitehead, Michael Norris**, Dylan Lardelli and **Victoria Kelly**. This collection has been widely distributed and I'm now down to the final box. Ten years

The essays are fine examples of the kind of intelligent writing about recent music from Aotearoa that we seldom see, while the works provide a snapshot of different compositional approaches from the mid-00s.

Jerome Kavanagh announced as NZSM/CNZ Composer-in-Residence 2022

Victoria University of Wellington has announced that taonga puoro musician and composer Jerome Kavanagh (Mokai Patea, Maniapoto, Kahungunu, Irish: Caomhanach) will be the 2022 NZSM/ CNZ Composer-in-Residence. Jerome has spent much of his career traveling abroad to bring Māori art and culture to the world, performing and collaborating with artists from a variety of different genres. He won a GRAMMY in 2011

for his work on the Christopher Tin album 'Calling all Dawns'.

Jerome will work on a variety of projects during the residency. He aims to compose, record, and release an album with Pōneke-based artists Salina Fisher and Neil MacLeod called 'Mana o te Wai—the power of water', about Wellington's forgotten waterways. He will also work on his second solo album, 'Oro Atua: Taonga Puoro Māori sound healing journey 2', saying "Oro Atua is about healing

through the vibration of the natural world, produced by taonga puoro. These sounds give us an opportunity for reflection and self-healing.”

The power of music to heal informs much of Jerome’s practice and he intends to work closely with the university’s music therapy department and to demonstrate the healing power of taonga puoro.

Lucy Mulgan receives Wakatipu Music Festival Commission

Lucy Mulgan has been selected by Wakatipu Music Festival and SOUNZ Centre for New Zealand Music to create a work of 7-8 minutes which will be performed by a combination of community musicians, young artists, and professional festival artists.

In response to news, Lucy says that she is “thrilled to receive this commission for the Wakatipu Music Festival in 2022.

It is so exciting to create a piece which will involve everyone – the community groups, young artists, professional players and singers.”

Lucy’s new work will be performed at the Wakatipu Music Festival on **18 April 2022** at the Queenstown Memorial Centre.

Alina Abraham wins two overseas competitions

Alina Abraham's poem for piano solo: *In the LightShadow of the Masters* has been awarded two prizes from overseas institutions. The piece won a 'Gold' medal for composition (piano) from Trinity International Music Competition online and a 'Platinum' award from the Canadian International Music Competition online.

The work is a series of composed miniatures for piano solo that were interconnected by improvisatory bridges based on pitch class 014. It was recorded at the Nelson Composers Workshop 2021, which Alina had attended previously as a performer (in 2003 and 2004), but this was her first time attending as a composer. Inspired by an incredibly warm reception for the piece from attendees at the workshop, Alina was encouraged to send her piece abroad as a

- A declaration that all rights to the video have been cleared. Name and contact information for the account or page hosting the video if it is not the composer.

Creative New Zealand Funding Rounds: Edwin Carr and Jack McGill Scholarships

The next Creative New Zealand funding round is now open and closes on the **25 February 2022**. This round includes the usual Art Grants applications as well as applications for the Edwin Carr and Jack McGill scholarships, which will be of particular interest to CANZ members.

APRA Art Music Fund 2022

Applications for the 2022 APRA Art Music Fund are now open. Australian and New Zealand art music composers are invited to apply for a \$5,000 (AUD) Art Music Fund grant to help them bring exciting new works to life. Eleven grants will be allocated to nine Australian and two New Zealand composers.

The Art Music Fund is an initiative of APRA AMCOS, in partnership with the Australian Music Centre and, for the first time, SOUNZ.

The funding is available for the creation of commissioned work that is innovative, displays professional compositional craft, and represents a benchmark of excellence in its field. The intention is to support composers to create works with a long artistic and performance life - whether it is presented in a concert hall, via live stream,

filmed, as a recording, installation, or other formats.

- If scores are not relevant to your music, you may submit audio and/or any other accompanying documentation in PDF format in lieu of scores.
- Selected composers will be notified by mid March 2022.
- Selected composers are expected to compose a new work for Riot Ensemble to be premiered in Schwaz. Pieces should be no longer than 10 minutes and precise instrumentation details will be provided by mid March 2022.
- The deadline for the score and parts of new piece is 31 July 2022.

The 76th Concours de Genève Composition Competition

The 76th Concours de Genève Composition Competition will be held in October 2022. Its objective is to distinguish new works, composed at the earliest after June 2019.

The Competition is open to composers of all nationalities born after 1 June, 1982 (40 years old). The work must be written for vocal ensemble of 6 voices comprised of the following: 1 bass, 1 baritone, 1 tenor, 1 mezzo, 1 soprano, 1 high soprano (mezzo-soprano can be replaced by a counter-tenor)

The work may also include electronics, but this is not mandatory.

The deadline for applications is **10 June 2022**

2022 The Second Hangzhou Contemporary Music Festival "Artinno Award" International Orchestra Composition Competition

The 2022 Hangzhou Contemporary Music Festival "Artinno Award" International Orchestral Composition Competition will be held in Zhejiang Conservatory of Music from October 14 to 18, 2022.

As one of the activities of Hangzhou Contemporary Music Festival, the 2022 "Artinno Award" International Orchestral Composition Competition call for outstanding orchestra pieces from young composers around the world.

The jury of the competition will select 6 outstanding winning works. These works will be performed by Sichuan Symphony Orchestra at the final concert on October 16, 2022, and the judges will decide the final rank based on the live performances. At that time, they will select one first-prize winner and award 100000 RMB; two second-prize winners with an award of 50000 RMB; three third-prize winners with a bonus of 20000 RMB (all of the amounts are pre-tax).

The Composition Committee of the festival will provide a set of tickets for all the winners of the 2022 Hangzhou Contemporary Music Festival, and will be responsible for the landing transportation and accommodation of foreign winners

during the festival (international travel expenses will not be covered).

Details:

1. There is no application fee.
2. The competition is open to composers from all nationalities, whether student or not, but only under 40 years old (born after 1982). Only one orchestra piece is allowed to be submitted by an applicant (concertos are not allowed).
3. The duration of the submitted piece should be between 10-12 minutes.
4. The instrumentation: 3 3 3 3/4 3 3 1/ timp. 4 perc. /1Harp/14 12 10 8 6.
5. The submitted pieces must have not been performed before, and must be composed after 2021.
6. The applicants should provide an **anonymous** PDF score to the competition committee via email to hzmf@zjcm.edu.cn before the **15th July 2022**. The applicants should also provide a scan of a valid ID, a personal photo in resolution higher than 1M, phone number, email address, address, a short biography around 150 words and a short introduction of the piece around 150 words.
7. The selected finalists should attend the rehearsal and premiere concert (except in special circumstances).

Harald Genzmer Composition Competition 2022

The Harald Genzmer Foundation is holding a composition competition for pieces written for violoncello and piano.

The competition is open to composers of all ages and nationalities.

The winning works should be suitable as repertoire pieces for the 'Jugend musiziert' (youth music) competition announced by the Deutscher Musikrat. Difficulty Level: III (medium difficulty). Works submitted must be unpublished, that is they must not have been publicly performed, broadcast, published or copied or circulated in any other way and should not exceed five minutes duration.

Up to three prizes may be awarded. The first prize is 4,000 Euros, second prize 2,500 Euros and third prize

1,500 Euros.

To enter, send:

- Five copies of the work (all identified by a four-digit number; do not include your name on the work!); the work should be digitally created or otherwise clearly legible.
- A sealed envelope bearing the four-digit number and containing name, date of birth, brief cv and address (including e-mail) and a declaration that the work has not been performed, broadcast, published or copied or circulated in any other way.
